We provide food to approximately 450 community-based pantries, soup kitchens, shelters, schools, and child and senior programs in our 33-county service area in central, eastern, and southern Arkansas.

These donated animals provide a nutritious source of protein desperately needed by feeding agencies. Meat is the least available food item for the feeding agencies due to its high cost. AHFH can turn 50 pounds of deer meat into 200 servings. Even with the high cost of processing the deer, it's still the best bargain in Arkansas.
Arkansas Museum of Science & History	Little Rock	AR	General Operating Support for Museum of Discovery STEM Educational Programs Serving Low-Income Students in Arkansas	The Museum of Discovery is committed to serving Arkansans of all ages, educational achievement levels, personal abilities, and cultural and socioeconomic backgrounds so that every Arkansan has access to high-quality STEM education. We strive to serve Arkansas students with the greatest need for access to unique, hands-on STEM education, particularly low-income children and youth. With the requested \$17,500 grant from the Entergy Charitable Foundation, the Museum of Discovery can serve at least 1,750 low-income students of all ages in 2017. These underserved students in grades K - 12 will benefit from a wide range of dynamic, hands-on STEM educational programs, particularly a Tesla Coil presentation about electricity, in the museum's Tesla Theater. In addition to exposing students to important STEM concepts, field trips to the Museum of Discovery serve at-risk students who often lack adult supervision and provide them with a safe, supervised learning environment when they are not in school.

The funds will be used for scholarships to help impoverished single parents enrolled in a job-focused post-secondary program of study. Local Single Parent Scholarship Fund volunteers and staff interview eligible applicants from the 63 counties where Entergy has a presence and select the individuals to be named as Entergy Scholars. Each workshop and seminar will teach educators how to integrate economic and personal finance concepts into the classroom curriculum; all training is certified by the Department of Education, i.e., standards-based and curriculum-aligned. By training teachers, rather than individual students, Economics Arkansas achieves a "multiplier effect." Teachers will share these lessons with their students throughout the 2017-18 school year and beyond. Students who understand how our free-market economy works and the roles they play as citizens, consumers, producers, and members of the workforce will possess the skills and insights necessary to succeed within this system. The Kota Camps provide opportunities for children with and without special needs to interact with one another and experience the benefits a traditional camp can offer. As a City surrounded by large bodies of water, this is a public safety concern. The Aquatic Center at the Healthplex will offer educational classes and ensure all public school children have the opportunity to participate.</p>
City Year	Little Rock	AR	Whole School Whole Child Social-Emotional Learning Program at Mabelvale Middle School	<p>Although Little Rock has made progress towards turning around low-performing schools, reform efforts cannot have the desired effect on achievement if students lack the non-cognitive skills to succeed. Social-emotional learning (SEL) -- the process of developing self-management and interpersonal skills -- is an important contributor to student success. This is particularly important because when a student feels connected to school, they are more likely to work hard and be involved in positive activities both inside and outside of school. City Year's Whole School Whole Child model helps students and schools succeed by providing a blend of school-wide and targeted school culture, SEL, and behavior supports throughout the school day that foster a positive school climate and promote students' school connectedness, community and civic mindedness, and self-perception as capable and committed learners. This is accomplished through the use of well-trained corps members who are near-peer role models.</p>

The Job-Readiness Project will better equip the adults in First Step's Supported Employment Program to enter the workforce. It is possessing the skills and the knowledge that enable a person to get dressed and groomed before going to work, to get to and from work, to take care of one's finances, and to operate within the workplace. Grant funds from Entergy will be used to equip a classroom with necessary furniture and resources for a learning environment. Vera Lloyd ensures all youth have health insurance and preventive primary, vision and dental care. We provide school supplies, transportation, study time, and encouragement to participate in extracurricular activities. We prepare healthy meals and provide healthy snacks at all times. The daily schedule includes required time for counseling, school, physical activity, tutoring, studying, and learning independent living skills. We model and carry out education related to social skills, independent living skills, and transitioning from foster care to independence.

They experience the highest high school dropout rates, the lowest rate of completion for college preparatory courses, and among the lowest college entrance and retention rates in the country. Only 13.6% of AIANs 25 years and over have earned a bachelor's degree or higher, compared to 29.3% of the population overall. AIANs are the most economically disadvantaged racial or ethnic group in the United States. In 2014, 28.3% of AIANs were living below the poverty level, the unemployment rate was 13.3% and per capita income \$17,135. Of the more than 4,100 Native scholars supported by the College Fund in 2015-16, 37% were first-generation, and 38% were single parents. The demand for scholarships for Native students continues to increase; the College Fund received nearly 11,000 applications for financial assistance in 2015-16. The College Fund believes the Entergy Tribal Scholarship Program aligns well with the Entergy Corporation's philanthropic interests in improving the quality of life in communities where Entergy operates. The College Fund respectfully requests a grant of \$30,000 to renew the Entergy Tribal Scholarship Program which will provide critical scholarship support to Native students. Preference will be given to students who are enrolled in the Houma tribe of Louisiana or who are attending schools in Louisiana, and secondary preference will be given to students who are from or who are attending schools in Arkansas, Texas, Mississippi, Massachusetts, Michigan, New York.</p>

Our families are referred from Zachary and the Greater Baton Rouge Region (a 7 parish area). Our youth report a consistent struggle to achieve and make wise choices due to 1) crisis in their home environment, 2) limited resources, 3) lack of supportive relationships, 4) limited academic and emotional support, 5) high levels of anxiety, and 7) an overwhelming sense of hopelessness. Without an intervention, these youth are, statistically, more likely to face homelessness, limited academic achievement, poverty, incarceration, and financial dependence on society. Heritage Ranch equips youth to make decisions which 1) diffuse current crisis, 2) reduce unsafe behaviors, 3) foster positive communication, 4) encourage personal accountability, 5) strengthen family unit, and 7) improve academic performance.

Lighthouse for the Blind	New Orleans	LA	Employment Services	Lighthouse Louisiana requests support for Employment Services for Persons with Disabilities, which serves people in the region who are blind, visually impaired, or deaf or who live with other disabilities. Employment provides purpose, inclusion, and socialization, as well as income to live a quality-filled life with independence. Lighthouse provides hands-on assistance and education, maintains community partnerships with potential employers, screens jobs for job-seeking clients, equips persons living with disabilities with adaptive techniques and skills necessary to gain employment and function independently at work, matches clients with disabilities with potential employers, provides job placement services, and provides job coaching as long as the client remains employed in the job placement. Like Energy, we "Power Life" and recognize that inclusion and diversity in the workplace is as great a benefit to the employer as it is to the employee.

As an organization, we believe New Schools for Baton Rouge is uniquely positioned to foster the creation of meaningful educational choices in Baton Rouge. We will do this by bringing high quality, open enrollment operators with a history of excellence from different sectors (public charter, diverse-by-design, scholarship, faith-based) to our community. We will also focus on the enabling conditions that surround these operators to ensure that the educational ecosystem empowers excellent schools to do what they do best.

To provide opportunities to immerse children in nature, where science learning is alive and ongoing, Teaching Responsible Earth Education (T.R.E.E.) will bring 1,800 New Orleans area students to learn science in an Outdoor Classroom. Three successful programs are involved. Earthkeepers™ (fourth grade) covers four life science concepts (energy flow, cycles, interrelationships, and change) and is held at Jean Lafitte National Park. Sunship Earth™ (fifth grade) focuses on seven life science concepts and offers a strong sense of community. Sunship III™ (seventh grade) deepens life science understanding and focuses on implications of decisions that affect the students' personal lives and their communities.

The Right Path Program Beaumont provides scholarships to both children of the incarcerated and/or paroled and any other student who can show a financial need and wants to obtain his GED or trade certificate. The Right Path Program Beaumont is a partnership with Lamar Institute of Technology to place financially challenged young adults in the Southeast Texas area at LIT so that they can receive the job training necessary to obtain gainful employment.

Using Darkness to Light's "Stewards of Children" (SOC) training, Garth House promotes community education by providing child sexual abuse prevention presentations to a variety of organizations and individuals. The most effective way to reduce the number of children affected by sexual abuse is to instruct the community on how to protect children, recognize abuse, and report suspicions. SOC training accomplishes these objectives in a two-hour, evidence-based, and DVD-driven class for adults. The curriculum includes video instruction by survivors of child sexual abuse, facilitator-led discussions, and an interactive workbook.

Last year, HAAM provided 789 households with rent and utility assistance. The majority of these households received (on average) \$200 in assistance from HAAM, while HUD's current Fair Market Rent limit and standard for Rent Reasonableness in our area is \$890 for a two bedroom apartment. This means that even with HAAM's help, many clients still fall extremely short and must turn to other agencies and churches for help. In some cases, HAAM is able to supplement a \$200 rent payment with funds from various grant sources, but the majority of those limited funds are restricted for use with residents of Harris County, leaving an even smaller pool of funding for those living in Montgomery County.</p> <p>To increase the amount of assistance currently offered to Montgomery County households that might not otherwise be assisted at all by the agency due to lack of resources, HAAM is requesting \$5,000 to better respond to clients requesting rent assistance.</p>
